The blind spot

Cities invest in venues, festivals, tourism, and live performance, but rarely see the workforce and infrastructure behind local recordings as a connected system.



Why it matters

The act of recording music forms community and produces a regional musical voice through sustained local working relationships.



What the Lab delivers

A costed action plan showing where local investment can generate more recording activity, skilled local work, stronger musical community, and a regional musical voice.



THE CLIMATE CASE

A city can build recording capacity collectively rather than duplicate it one bedroom at a time.

Shared, affordable studios and equipment can reduce repeated purchases, shipping, packaging, and waste while supporting the local working relationships through which skills, community, and a regional musical voice emerge.

LSRI works with the local host to define the focus, identify participants, and design the Lab.

CONVENE

LSRI facilitates a workshop with musicians, producers, engineers, studio owners, educators, and organizations across the local recording ecosystem.

ANALYZE DATA

LSRI combines survey data with what was learned in the Lab to identify local strengths, gaps, needs, and shared priorities.



4

DELIVER ACTION PLAN

Deliver a Local Recording Ecosystem Action Plan with costed options for strengthening the local recording workforce, infrastructure and recording activity.
